#### **NOTES:**

- 1. This battalion was based at Pembroke Dock. It was deployed to France, joining the 131<sup>st</sup> Infantry Brigade on the 4<sup>th</sup> May 1940.
- 2. Based in Shrewsbury, this regiment was converted in February 1940 into an artillery role, becoming the:

75<sup>th</sup> (Shropshire Yeomanry) Medium Regiment, Royal Artillery.

The regiment served in the U.K. until leaving for the Middle East in March 1943. It fought in North Africa under command of the 8<sup>th</sup> Army, moving to Italy in September 1943, where it fought for the rest of the war.

In April 1940, the regiment formed a duplicate regiment, namely the:

76<sup>th</sup> (Shropshire Yeomanry) Medium Regiment, Royal Artillery

Again, this regiment ended the war in Italy, having served in Iraq from February 1943 to May 1943, and then Palestine. It moved to Italy in April 1944.

- 3. This regiment was formed in 1939 as the duplicate of the 60<sup>th</sup> (Royal Welch Fusiliers) Anti-Tank Regiment. All five batteries were based in Mold. The regiment was allocated to the 38<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division, formally joining that division in October 1939. It continued to serve with that division, based in the U.K., until the end of the war.
- 4. This regiment was formerly the 61<sup>st</sup> (Caernarvon and Denbigh (Yeomanry) Medium Brigade, R.G.A.. Headquarters and 243<sup>rd</sup> Batteries were based in Colwyn Bay, with the 242<sup>nd</sup> battery being based in Llandudno. It started the war under the command of Home Forces, but went to France with the B.E.F. in October 1939. After evacuation from Dunkirk, the regiment remained in the U.K. until landing in Normandy with the 8<sup>th</sup> Army Group, Royal Artillery. The regiment fought throughout the campaign in North West Europe until the end of the war.
- 5. In 1939, the 61<sup>st</sup> Medium Regiment formed a duplicate regiment, known as the 69<sup>th</sup> Medium Regiment. Headquarters and 241<sup>st</sup> Batteries were based in Bangor, with the 244<sup>th</sup> Battery being based in Wrexham. The regiment deployed to France from September 1939 until evacuated in May 1940. In December 1942, it joined the 8<sup>th</sup> Army in North Africa, later serving in Palestine and Italy. The regiment transferred to North West Europe in April 1945, where it served until the end of the war.
